## Peddlers must wear City-Approved ID

Prompted by a barrage of complaints from residents feeling harassed by door-to-door solicitors, City Council revised the Peddlers and Solicitation Ordinance to require a permit before most persons, businesses, or organizations can engage in this type of activity in our City. The purpose of the ordinance is to regulate these business practices by providing a framework for hours of operation and identification of City-approved peddlers and solicitors. It balances the privacy and safety of our residents with the rights of businesses to sell products and services. The ordinance defines the difference between peddlers who “sell” products or services for profit and “solicitors” who request money or your time on behalf of a non-profit. With rare exceptions, all peddlers and solicitors must obtain a permit from the City before going door-to-door. The identification badge that you see pictured below is an example of the only approved badge the City issues. Every peddler or solicitor must wear this i.d. visible at all times. Soliciting is permitted only from the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Solicitors cannot block traffic, trespass on a property posted with a “No Soliciting” sign, engage in threatening, harassing, or abusive behavior, request any material that requires the resident to retrieve something from inside the house or request to enter a person’s residence. If a resident feels that any peddler or solicitor has violated the ordinance, call the Non-Emergency Police Dispatch number at 777-6700 immediately. Please, include the peddler/solicitor’s name and the business/organization represented, if possible. Both pieces of information should be clearly visible on the id. badge.

## Decision 2012 Your Vote Counts



### WHO CAN VOTE IN THE GENERAL ELECTION?

You can vote if you’ve registered to vote in Michigan by October 9, 2012.



### HOW CAN I OBTAIN AN ABSENTEE BALLOT?

As a registered voter, you may obtain an absentee voter ballot if you are:

- age 60 years old or older
- unable to vote without assistance at the polls
- expecting to be out of town on Election Day
- in jail awaiting arraignment or trial
- unable to attend the polls due to religious reasons
- appointed to work as an election inspector in a precinct outside of your precinct of residence.

### WHEN DOES MY ABSENTEE BALLOT NEED TO BE RETURNED?

Absentee ballots must be received by the City Clerk’s Office before the polls close at 8:00 p.m. on November 6. Do not mail in your absentee ballot if you are not sure that the City will receive it on time. You can drop it off in the white mailbox in front of City Hall at any time. City employees check the box several times a day or you can drop it off at the City Clerk’s Office during regular business hours—Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The Clerk’s Office will also be open on Saturday, November 3 from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. for absentee voting. Registered voters can also vote by absentee ballot at the Clerk’s Office until 4:00 p.m. on Monday, November 5. All absentee ballots are counted on Election Day.



### MUST I VOTE THE ENTIRE BALLOT?

You are not required to vote the entire ballot. You may pick and choose the races or ballot proposals for which you want to vote. Skipping sections of the ballot does not invalidate your ballot.



### DOES A “STRAIGHT” TICKET COVER ALL CANDIDATES IN THAT PARTY?

Yes. At the top of each political party’s column on the ballot, there is an opportunity to vote “straight” party, Which selects all candidates on that party’s ticket with single vote.



### CAN I VOTE A “SPLIT” TICKET?

Yes. You can vote a “straight” party ticket and vote for individual candidates under any other party OR you can vote individual candidates of your choice in each race.



### CAN I VOTE IF I AM DISABLED?

Yes. All precincts are equipped with voting machines that allow a disabled voter to cast a secret ballot on their own. The AutoMARK System functions as an electronic pencil allowing the voter to hear the ballot choices and make their selection by touch screen or key pad.



Near the conclusion of the October 15, 2012 meeting of the City Council, Mayor Kip Walby made an exciting announcement: the preliminary audit indicates that the City will have ended Fiscal Year 2011-2012

with a \$1.2 million surplus! This represents \$1.2 million of savings that will be put into our "rainy day" fund. To put this in perspective: when the City Council voted on the budget, it was projected that if nothing in the budget was reduced throughout the upcoming year we would have to use \$878,000 out of our rainy day fund to bridge the gap between revenues and expenses. I was not happy with this projection when it was made. Fortunately, as it was promised, throughout the fiscal year many changes did happen – including some structural changes that will benefit us for years to come. These are changes that do not impact how the City looks to you, or the services you receive, but they did positively impact how your money is spent.

I congratulate and thank my colleagues and the members of Administration and Staff who worked so hard to make this a reality. While other cities have been forced to cut services, postpone investment, and lay off employees to balance their budgets, I am thrilled to report that our City remains strong in personnel, services, safety, infrastructure, and finances. And we're putting money into our savings account, rather than taking it out. How many cities in Michigan can boast that success?

I also want to touch upon two recent City events. On October 12, I had the honor of attending the touching ribbon cutting ceremony for the brand-new Maloof Family Pavilion. Thanks to the continued generosity of Mr. Fred Maloof, our Veterans Memorial Park now features a beautiful new gathering place that will be enjoyed by our residents and guests for years to come. Mr. Maloof, who over the years has supported generously a number of causes throughout the community, donated nearly \$250,000 to make this a reality. It's clear that he loves the community, and that the community loves him right back. We thank Mr. Maloof once again for the incredible gift.

On October 17, our Senior Center hosted the "Jamz & Java" event: a fun evening of shopping, coffee, food, live music and friendship. People of all ages attended and, like the Fall Harvest event last month, this event showcased our wonderful Senior Center to people who may not have had the opportunity to stop in before. At both events, it was terrific to see new and familiar faces enjoying what the Senior Center has to offer. Hats off once again to Director Sue Fickau and her staff and volunteers for their tireless work to challenge the notion of what a "senior center" does and to make our Senior Center the most vibrant one in the area.

# Snow event VS snow emergency

## What you need to know this winter!

During the winter months, many St. Clair Shores residents - including children walking to school and the physically challenged - need to be able to safely use the public sidewalks. This means that all snow and ice should be removed from the entire constructed width enabling people of all ages and physical conditions to have access to clean pedestrian walkways. City Ordinance 30.012 (SNOW EVENT), amended in February, 2009, is intended to provide for safe passage and to protect the general health, safety and welfare of the St. Clair Shores residents and those using the public walkways.

In addition, City Ordinance 21.800 (SNOW EMERGENCY) is intended to clear the streets of any parked vehicles so the City snowplows can remove ice and snow from the streets to allow for safe travel. The following are highlights from the ordinance that all residents and property owners need to know.

The Mayor or the City Manager may declare a SNOW EVENT after 2 inches of snow has fallen or accumulated. A SNOW EMERGENCY can also be declared after 4 to 6 inches of snow has fallen or accumulated. The City will notify residents of a SNOW EVENT or SNOW EMERGENCY by one or all of the following means of communication:

- An advisory message on the main telephone line at City Hall . Call 445-5200 for details.
- Notification to local television and radio stations.
- An alert on the SCSTV Community Bulletin Board which is broadcast on Comcast, WOW and AT&T.
- Notices on Nixle, the Police Department's emergency notification system, the City's website at scsmi.net, and a City of St. Clair Shores Facebook posting.

After the declaration of a SNOW EVENT, residents and businesses have forty-eight (48) hours to remove snow or ice from sidewalks and walkways.

- Forty-eight (48) hours after a SNOW EVENT has been declared, the City's snow removal contractor will canvas the City by street and neighborhood looking for violators. A written notice will be placed on the violator's property stating that the property will be re-inspected in twenty-four (24) hours.
- If the snow or ice is not removed within twenty-four (24) hours, the City contractor will remove it. The contractor will leave a notice stating that the City removed the snow or ice.

Penalties and fees for violations during a SNOW EVENT may be assessed as follows:

**FIRST OFFENSE:** \$30 or the actual contractor's cost to remove the snow or ice plus a \$65 administrative fee. No ticket will be issued.

**SECOND OFFENSE:** \$30 or the actual contractor's cost to remove the snow or ice, the \$65 administrative fee, and a civil infraction ticket of up to \$50 plus court costs.

**THIRD OFFENSE:** \$30 or the actual contractor's cost to remove the snow or ice, the \$65 administrative fee, and a civil infraction ticket of up to \$100 plus court costs.

The SNOW EVENT ordinance also provides for a two-tiered appeal process. First, any resident who does not agree with the penalties and fees may appeal in writing to the City Manager within twenty-one days after receiving the invoice for the City snow removal. Second, if the resident does not agree with the City Manager's decision, an appeal can be made to the Property Maintenance Board of Appeals. This five person board includes three residents, one Council person and one staff member. The decision of the Board of Appeals is final. For more information, contact Code Enforcement at 447-3399.

A NO PARKING ban goes into effect twelve (12) hours after a SNOW EMERGENCY has been declared by the Mayor or City Manager. Per City Ordinance, no vehicles may park on any City street—residential or main street—for the duration of the SNOW EMERGENCY. It is imperative that the City's snowplows have clear access to streets for snow removal so citizens can travel on them safely. Violation of the no parking ban could result in a \$35 ticket and or the towing/impounding of the parked vehicle. Towing charges are \$55 plus a \$10 per day storage fee. Residents will be notified when the SNOW EMERGENCY is lifted through the avenues detailed above. Questions or concerns regarding tickets or towing or impounding of vehicles as a result of a violation of the snow emergency ordinance may be directed to the St. Clair Shores Police Department at 445-5300.

Through this partnership we took a dilapidated and underutilized area and revitalized and reenergized it making the Civic Arena more competitive with other ice rinks in neighboring cities. The Center includes a full complement of equipment including a TRX training system that makes it easier for younger people to lift weights. Many thanks to everyone who donated time and resources to help St. Clair Shores move forward and offer the kind of amenities that attract younger families to our City.
